About this Image

- The train stopped in Rapid City, South Dakota on April 22, 1948
- There, the mayor, Fred Dusek (the man on the left) posed for this photograph with Leonard Foolish Woman.
- Leonard Foolish Woman was Ogalala, Lakota, and Sioux.

About The Spirit of 1776

- The first Freedom Train (there were two) was proposed in April 1946 by [Attorney General Tom C. Clark](#), who believed that Americans had begun taking the principles of liberty for granted in the post-war years.
- The [National Archives](#) supplied the train with key documents...
- The Spirit of 1776" locomotive pulled seven cars loaded with some of the most important artifacts of American history:
 - the newly iconic flag from Joe Rosenthal's Iwo Jima photograph;
 - the Emancipation Proclamation and Gettysburg Address;
 - a letter from Christopher Columbus;
 - George Washington's original copy of the Constitution; and
 - the Declaration of Independence itself.
 - The train even carried an original of the Magna Carta of 1215.
- This train came through Denver on May 23, 1946
